Awesome. Well, let's start by having each of you introduce yourselves, and tell us a little bit about where you're from and what you do. So, Tucker, take it away for us.

Sure. My name's Tucker. I live in Raleigh, North Carolina. I've been working as a service plumber the last four years now, but I've been in plumbing for, like, six total. I started out in new construction, and three years after that, I got into residential service.

My name's Jose Lopez, and I'm the owner of My Plumbing Friends out of Southwest Florida.

I came to the US in 2004. I'm originally from Cuba, and English is actually my second language, which is a pretty cool thing. A lot of customers tell me I don't have an accent, so it's always good to hear that I've come a long way.

You know, it feels approachable and personal. You know, what, what's the story behind it? How did you come up with that saying?

That was kinda like a, a little thing. Uh, I, I worked for a company.

A big reason that that means something to me is 'cause my dad's a mechanic. And so, he's kind of always helped me and my siblings with, like, issues with our cars or people in our family. And you know, it saves a lot of money.

No one's been able to come out and help me," or, "The, the landlord that I have isn't getting somebody to do this." And being able to go and solve that problem they have, whether it be no water, no hot water, can't run sewer or anything like that-

different. I, I was like, "I'm just gonna do it and I'm not gonna say anything to anyone." Like, I didn't tell my
family. My wife was the only one that knew. And so, it was funny, like, a couple months later, my accounts had
kind of taken off a little bit.

Um, question for you guys. So, being in the trades myself for many, many years, it was always a challenge for me to balance work/life, okay? So you have your family, you have your friends.

Tucker, I'll be honest with you. I read some of the stuff you do. I don't even know how you have any time to do any plumbing- ... with the simple fact that you're into rock climbing, soccer, I mean, snowboarding. I mean, my goodness. You should be on, uh, ESPN somewhere, I think. But how do you guys go about, you know, making sure you're creating that work/life balance so you don't get that burnout?

So for me, it's, uh, honestly, social media has helped me a lot with that. I used to work all the time. I would work Saturdays and I'd take afternoon calls and, and stuff like that. But being able to have some financial aid from doing social media-

... that has helped my work/life balance. Uh, making videos does take time, but it's nothing like running calls at all. And it's something you can do in your bed or, you know, just at home. And so, that's helped my work/life balance where I don't have to w- I don't have to work as much now. I still, still work Monday through Friday, but I'm not so focused and immersed in my work that, that way I can just come home at, at five to spend time with my, my family. I have two little girls. And so, I spend time with them, and then the stuff that I want to do for myself, I do when, uh, like at night when my kids are asleep or if I get off early or something, I'll squeeze something in. And snowboarding specifically is seasonal and-

So, I actually, I just hired two guys.

So if I have to run a call on a Saturday or a Sunday, that takes time away from my wife, takes time away from the family, et cetera. Then there's an after hours charge.

That was that part of it. Now, it's more like I have two guys, so I can send them to go run calls and I can make time to do marketing or shake hands, pass out business cards, spend more time with the family if I want to.

All right. So I want to talk a little bit about the plumbing industry and the trade. So, what do you think, uh, Jose, we'll start with you, are some of the common misconceptions you both hear about plumbers or the plumbing trade?

That drain cleaning is not plumbing. It's definitely plumbing. You know?

It takes patience and it definitely takes some skill. You have to know how to feel the, the cable and where you're at in the line.... and, uh... Yeah. I would say that's probably the biggest misconception.

I would say that the biggest thing, the biggest misconception I hear all the time is that plumbers are just playing in sewage or you're constantly in some sort of sewage incident.

Um, which isn't the case at all. You could go your whole plumbing career and never even have to touch any sort of sewage. You could be just in new construction or anything like that. And so, I- I try and touch on that, and I like talking about that for the younger generation, 'cause there's not a lot of people, young people getting into the trades.

And so, it's nice to share things like that to say, "Hey, this job may look like this, but it's not. There's a lot more to it." And that's the cool thing about plumbing is there's so many different fields and, uh, ways that you can do it that you can pick something you like-

So, how do you stay motivated and keep learning on the job? You know, what's the best way for you to kind of learn new technology or what's happening or you want to figure out how to get better or faster at something?

I think networking, especially now that I'm in with this group of, like, excellent people and the OD program and all of that. Just networking and watching what some of these other guys are doing.

That's really the new way of learning, just... Hey, like, today, I didn't even know they had that automatic deburring tool that's really a drywall tool or something.

Uh, which they were great and they taught me a lot, but it wasn't until I started watching videos or, or networking and meeting people like this, learning all these new ways to do things, better ways, faster ways, new tools. Like, we never used press guns. Like, I didn't know what those were until I started seeing videos. So networking and, and getting to meet people like this really, really can change the game for you.

Yeah, for sure. So we... You talked a little bit about Evan giving you some insight into how he got started with videos. And this is for both of you as a question. Are there any ways you're mentoring or inspiring the next generation of tradespeople, either through online communication or in person through apprentice programs or working with your local tech schools?

Yes. So I am actually trying to partner up. I- I have a f- a friend that is a teacher in the Labelle Plumbing School in Florida.

So yes, I definitely, totally want to help, like, the new generation, especially if they're putting in the work and going to school for this. To be able to be your own boss right after that, I would say that's the greatest thing. And then that way, you don't have to, you know, work for someone else and-

... do all this things. You could just get out of school and work for yourself, because that's what most people want to go to school for.

And part of the job that I do is working with new hires. And I- I guess for me, it's not the best example because we don't typically hire unskilled labor. Like, somebody that has to come into the company has to already know somewhat of what they're doing in the trade. But it is actually extremely difficult in, in my experience. Like, the people we hire g- either don't last or they just immediately don't work out for- for whatever reason. And it's been a big challenge. And I know speaking to other people in my area or just other people that I've talked to that are business owners have had a really hard time.... hiring because as so many tradesmen are retiring, there's just not very many young-

... people getting in the trade. And so, a lot of the good people that are, um, out there working are already hired with another company. So it's just hard to-

Yeah. So hiring is tough. It's... It was the toughest decision, one of the toughest decisions for me, because it's like starting a business all over again. And it's really hard to let somebody else put their name on... Like, their work on-

... under your name, you know? So that was hard to, like, get over that. And I was able to overcome it because I have to do it eventually. So I decided to hire, like, two very, like, experienced, like, guys that are just already trained. I knew them from working with them in the past when I didn't have my company, and it just so happens that they both became available, and I said, "Okay, I could take both of you under my wing." And that way, I know now that they're set and they're ready to train somebody else.

And then I don't have to worry too much about, oh, the new hire is out there on his own. I could have them ride with these guys, and I trust them fully, fully to tell me, "Hey, this guy's not a good fit. This guy's a good fit." But finding a skilled person that wants... Like, doesn't want a million bucks a year, that's also hard.

Because a lot of these companies are commission-based and they are huge companies. They charge a lot. So sthey're really good technicians, already making a lot. So for a small business owner to be able to match-

You know, what are your hopes and dreams for the trades, um, maybe as you retire, as you guys are both starting and talking about your new business? But as you kind of leave this trade, what do you hope kind of changes from everyone's perception?

Yeah, I'd like, I'd like people to look at the trades in a different light because as of right now, it kind of seems like, oh, you, you get into trades because you sucked at school or-
